GOD SAVE THE QUEEN

Hand Crosses Window Mother-To-Son Farewell

LONDON, Feb. 15 — (AP)— Queen Mary, who will be 85 in May, watched from Marlborough House today the funeral procession for her son, the King. She spared herself from personal participation in the London procession and in the trip to Windsor. Queen Mary sat in the only window of her home that was not covered with blinds. As the

coffin came into view she stood, then passed her hand across the window in a gesture of farewell. As the four ranking dukes passed, the Duke of Windsor, himself a former king, turned and saluted his mother. Salutes came, too, from the Dukes of Edinburgh, Gloucester and Kent. Queen Elizabeth and the Queen Mother bowed toward the window as they passed down the Mall.
